A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

The Open-Air School of Pottstown returned in the fall of 2020! One hundred years after opening its doors in 1918, Wyndcroft teachers and students return to our historical roots and spend considerable time outdoors allowing for instruction and interaction in the plentiful open-air spaces. Eager to begin school in person after a spring of Remote Learning, Wyndcroft opened its doors to children and staff in September with the goals of keeping our community safe and to maximize the academic and emotional growth for children without disruption. Utilizing our resources, including flexible learning spaces, and the commitment to health and safety measures, our students continue to grow and flourish despite the setbacks the pandemic has brought to our region and our nation.

The Wyndcroft community banded together in like-minded agreement to uphold health and safety guidelines at school and at home that allow students and staff to maintain the benefits of in-person instruction. The 'Non Sibi 'spirit of the entire community continues to help mitigate the many risk factors of COVID-19. Strong sick policies, temperature scans, outdoor lunches and classes, grade level cohorts, physical distancing, and plenty of handwashing and sanitizing of surfaces are daily occurrences at home and at school. Hiring, evaluating and nurturing the Head of School is among the most important responsibilities of the Board of Trustees of an independent school. So, when Gail informed us that she would be retiring at the end of the 2020-2021 academic year, we knew we had an important and daunting task in front of us.

The entire Search Committee, led by co-chairs Oscar Guererro and Maria Shields, worked tirelessly on behalf of the whole Wyndcroft community. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, we wish to express our gratitude for their efforts and their devotion to our School and its mission. I am so proud of the work done and I am so excited about what lies ahead!

It is my privilege to announce that based on the unanimous recommendation of the Search Committee and enthusiastic approval by the Board of Trustees, *our next*Head of School of the Wyndcroft School will be Dr. Tekakwitha M. Pernambuco-Wise.



Dr. Pernambuco-Wise rose to the top of a highly qualified pool of candidates early in our process. As the committee learned more about her, our enthusiasm for her candidacy grew even stronger. Like the other two finalists, Dr. Pernambuco-Wise has prior experience as a head of school, showed poise and professionalism in front of the search committee and ultimately the whole Wyndcroft Community and expressed a genuine interest and enthusiasm for leading Wyndcroft into the future. She distinguished herself, however, as the committee critically assessed who would best address the opportunities and challenges that the community and the Board of Trustees identified early on in our search process.

As with each of our finalists, the Search Committee undertook a detailed and comprehensive reference and background check effort. Indeed, after speaking with trustees, parents, administrators and faculty, and local and national leaders in the independent school community who have known and worked with Tekakwitha for years, there truly was only one clear choice for Wyndcroft. She is consistently praised by those who know

her best for her servant leadership style, for the work she has done to support and develop faculty, for the quality of the curricular changes she helps to put in place, for her ability to listen and be open to others' ideas and also for her willingness to make a decision and own its implementation, and her ability to raise the profile of her schools in the local community.

Please join me in welcoming Dr. Pernambuco-Wise, and her husband, Dr. Paul Pernambuco-Wise, to the Wyndcroft community! We are planning (hopefully in-person) opportunities to welcome them, as well as to provide a proper send-off to Gail as she moves into her well-deserved retirement later in the spring/summer. In the interim, our transition planning is underway. BACK ON CAMPUS

After mandated shutdowns and distance learning last Spring, Wyndcroft came back to campus as scheduled in September and has been running strong ever since.

Here's a closer look at what's been happening on campus this year.

When Wyndcroft was founded in 1918, we were an open-air school, with students spending the majority of their time outside. This year as we return to campus during the COVID-19 pandemic, students returned to learning outside for a portion of their day. Wyndcroft expanded its outdoor educational spaces so classes could take place in the open air. Teachers thought outside-the-classroom and came up with new and interesting ways to have their students learn in this new environment. The warmer fall weather saw many classes and lunches on the greenspaces next to The Marshall House and Dau House. This ability to be outside was enjoyed by all and we suspect will continue even after the pandemic is over.



With restrictions to large group gatherings, Wyndcroft was offered the chance to be creative with how we keep many of our time-honored traditions alive. Thanks to the technology that is available around the school and a flexible and creative staff, students are still able to enjoy school-wide events together. The feeling of community is alive at Wyndcroft!



Chapel - At Wyndcroft, Chapel is a time when the whole school comes together to explore topics and review what's happening around campus. These meetings are student-led, allowing students to stand in front of their peers and make presentations, practicing their public speaking skills. This year, Chapel remains student-led but is held in a virtual environment. The presenting class is in the auditorium, standing behind a podium, but they are presenting to a web camera. Each classroom logs in to a Zoom meeting and is able to see the presenters. In this ever-changing world, the skill of presenting to a virtual audience has become more and more important so we are thrilled to be able to extend this learning to our students while maintaining the weekly tradition of Chapel.



Batwing Ball - Halloween at Wyndcroft is always highly anticipated by the student body. For our Lower School, it means an afternoon of not-so-spooky fun. For the Upper School, it means a costume dance party in the evening. All of these things happened this year, they just looked a little different. On the afternoon of the Batwing Ball, each Lower School grade came individually to the auditorium for a dance party with a DJ. Then, students in the 8th Grade "zoomed" with the individual classrooms, leading them in seasonally-themed games. That evening, the 8th Grade came to school for a live dance party while the other grades "zoomed" in and joined from home.

French Fete - One of the ways that Wyndcroft prepares our students to be a part of a global community is through our French language program. Every student at Wyndcroft takes French! And so French Fete, our annual celebration, is an all-school opportunity to demonstrate our understanding and appreciation for French language and culture. Our 8th Grade Elves enjoyed an afternoon leading holiday-themed games for students in Grades K-7. Making visits over Zoom, the Elves and younger students enjoyed playing BINGO and hangman and other virtual games together.

On the Friday prior to the Winter Break, an all-school virtual assembly was held. The 2nd grade Bell Choir gave a holiday performance and our Pre-Kindergarten students gave an adorable reading of *T'was the Night Before Christmas*.



TECHNOLOGY AND WYNDCROFT



Many of the adjustments made for the COVID-19 pandemic were possible because of a well-established vision of technology around the campus and in the curriculum including 1:1 iPads and Chromebooks. Students and staff alike are accustomed to using different hardware and software to meet their classroom goals, whether they are at home or on campus.

Once again this year, our students have excelled in the Coder-Z online competition. 71 students participated in the competition, completing over 1,250 missions. The top 8 students at Wyndcroft are all pictured here with their certificates of merit. The top two participants also won a Raspberry Pi 4 Computer.







FACULTY NEWS

Wyndcroft's newest faculty member is not a new face to campus. Zach Risell, the new Upper School French Teacher, is a 2008 graduate of Wyndcroft, bringing a unique perspective of being a former student at the school into his classroom. We asked Monsieur Risell what it's like to be back at his alma mater.

What do you remember from your days at Wyndcroft as a student?

I came to Wyndcroft in 5th Grade from a public elementary school. Immediately, I was excited about switching classes and having a locker. That was very exciting! Once I got into 6th grade, I really enjoyed having the same teacher for each subject for multiple years. We really got to know the teachers and they got to know us as well. I can't wait to share that experience with my own students.

How did studying French in middle school at Wyndcroft help you in your future studies? Even though I didn't have the benefit of Wyndcroft's Lower School French program, I really enjoyed getting started with my French studies. I was so well-prepared for secondary school foreign languages that I tested into French 2 Honors at Shipley and continued my studies there. Then, when I went to Gettysburg College, I kept right on going with French. It all started at Wyndcroft!

Do you think that being a Wyndcroft graduate is helpful for you as a teacher here? Absolutely! Even though it has been more than a decade since I graduated, Wyndcroft still holds its students to the same high standards that I experienced. I know what it's like to carry that Upper School workload and balance extracurriculars as well. I think this gives me good insight as to what my students are experiencing at this stage in their life.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Here's a look at some of the training our faculty and staff have taken over the past year.

During the summer, our lower school and special area teachers took part in additional training on the Seesaw platform. Seesaw is not only a great platform for remote learning, it is also an effective teaching tool for the classroom and provides a streamlined resource for teacher/parent communication. All of our lower school and special area teachers are now Seesaw Pioneers which means they have moved beyond the basics and are able to gain and share ideas with experts in the Seesaw community. In addition, **Shannon Stone, Brooke Musser,** and **Anna Palmer** are certified Seesaw Ambassadors, a global community of educators who connect, teach, and lead others.

Upper school teachers took part in online Google educator training to help equip them with new and better ways to use Google Classroom tools to boost learning, save time, inspire creativity, and help students become more responsible digital citizens.

K-4 teachers have adopted a new series from Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, *HMH Into Reading*, and took part in several days of training including during our in-service day in October. This series is designed to support literacy and guide students as they transition from emerging readers to effective writers. The series was built to enable teachers to tailor learning to individual students and also to fit their teaching style and the unique classroom needs.

In addition, for our in-service day, the upper school and special area teachers took part in a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) workshop led by Brandon Jacobs, Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at the Shipley School. The workshop was focused on understanding the definitions/concepts of diversity, equity and inclusion and building a deeper knowledge of how DEI impacts schools and students. The workshop also provided an opportunity to connect and discuss with colleagues as well as tips and suggestions on how to incorporate elements of DEI into the classroom.

Katy Bressi attended an online seminar for school nurses on the best, up-to-date critical strategies to address COVID-19 and related Issues. She is also took a COVID-19 contact tracing course offered by Johns Hopkins University.

Angelina Fickert attended MCIU-2 online classes as part of the virtual classroom management series. The topic was Student Engagement, Time Management and Perceived Motivation; Assessment in the Online Environment.

Through the Bureau of Education, **Ken Dorris** took part in two online courses designed to help create new K-8 programs for safe and socially distant PE during Covid-19.

Brooke Musser attended the *The Teach Your Heart Out* conference, a virtual conference with educators from all over the county coming together during this tough year of the pandemic. The conference focused on many different parts of education for children ranging from how to teach via Zoom and keeping your students engaged over a computer, social and emotional learning for young children, to reading and math strategies plus many more.

EARLY LEARNING CENTER RENAMED THE MARSHALL HOUSE



The 2020-2021 school year marks the end of an era at Wyndcroft. Alice Marshall Sharp `58 stepped down from the Board of Trustees after 18 years of dedicated service to the school. We can't thank her enough for all she has done for Wyndcroft!

Throughout our history, Alice and her family have been at the forefront of support for our School. Join us now in honoring Charles N. Marshall '55, Alice Marshall Sharp '58, and Eliza Marshall Baird '60, and the memory of their parents Donnell Marshall and Cornelia Brooke Marshall, as we rededicate Highland House as The Marshall House.

The Marshall connection with Wyndcroft goes back almost to our founding in 1918. Alice Marshall Sharp writes us, "Our mother, then Cornelia Brooke, attended Wyndcroft in its earliest incarnation at The Hill School for a very brief period, probably c. 1920 before her family moved to Philadelphia for the winter." Wyndcroft was founded on the Hill School campus in 1918 and moved to its present location in 1925. "Our father, Donnell Marshall, was on the Board of Governors (later the Board of Trustees) ... in the 1950's."

At Wyndcroft the Marshall children built strong foundations for their later education.

Charles '55 went on to St. Mark's School, then Princeton University and the University of Michigan Law School. He then worked as a lawyer for the B & O and various other railroad companies before becoming Conrail's chief commercial officer. Later, he became President of Genesee & Wyoming, a worldwide railroad holding company. After retirement, he was Chairman of the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy, and he organized the Rail Transportation Engineering program at Penn State-Altoona.

When asked about his memories of Wyndcroft, Charles says, "For the most part, I'll defer to my sisters to reminisce for all of us as they wish. I would add only that Miss Obie [Wyndcroft's legendary Angeline V. Oberholtzer] and Mrs. Mellon were inspirational. They embedded in many of us the notion that proper punctuation and correct spelling are the keys to a long and happy life."

Alice '58 transferred after sixth grade to Agnes Irwin, then spent two years at Hollins College. She took a secretarial course in Philadelphia, then joined college friends in New York and worked in publishing there and later in London. "Much later," she says, "I renewed my interest in art and am currently doing a good deal of drawing. A collection of my feather drawings is currently hanging at the Audubon Center at Mill Grove." Wyndcroft also is lucky to have a few of her drawings in The Marshall House Conference Room!

Alice goes on to say, "There was a real sense of family among Wyndcroft students, their parents, and faculty. Classes were very small which meant individual attention

and responsibility. Art teachers seemed especially good to me. Our grounding in English and Math was particularly good."

"Having been on the Board of Trustees at Wyndcroft for eighteen years, I have been gratified to see many of the same attributes that our family enjoyed and profited from. And parents and faculty remain committed to continuing to provide an exceptional foundation for a child's education."

Eliza '60 finished 4th grade at Wyndcroft in 1956. She then attended Agnes Irwin for 4 years (through 8th grade) and then graduated from St. Timothy's School in 1964. After Bennett College, a 2 year college, she majored in Interior Design at Parsons School of Design in New York, graduating in 1970. Years later she graduated from NYU where she received a BA degree in Economics in 1989.

When asked about her memories of Wyndcroft, she writes us, "I have wonderful memories of the six years I spent at Wyndcroft \dots . The school prepared me for the education that followed \dots "

"Starting off in a small school with lots of individual attention was so important. Each teacher did her best to help and inspire me. There were plenty of special events I remember, such as Field Day and Dancing around the May Pole in crepe paper costumes. With the small classes, we all knew each other well and were good friends. We took lunch boxes to school. Things were simple but fun."

"Looking back, it was the best foundation any child could have. As Wyndcroft grows I'm sure it will remain a strong influence on each student there."

HISTORY OF THE MARSHALL HOUSE AT WYNDCROFT

Constructed in 1916 when "Rosedale" was just beginning its conversion from farmland to the residential neighborhood it is today, Marshall House is rich in Wyndcroft history. It was once the home of the Gutmueller and later the Pollock families, whose children were Wyndcroft graduates. Marshall House was added to our campus in 2012 after a thorough restoration that added modern safety and accessibility features. It now houses our Early Learning Center as well as the offices of the Head of School and most of our Leadership Team.

William Baas graduated in August 2020 with his doctorate in organizational leadership from Northeastern University.


CLASS OF 2003
