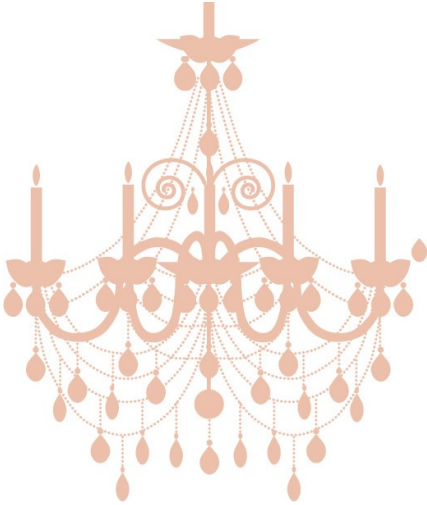
- In the 1920's and 1930's, students tried their hand at some screen-free toys and games including pogo sticks, marbles, pick up sticks and jacks.

MOTIVATIONAL SPEAKER

Wyndcroft students in grades 3-8 spent time on Wednesday, October 25 with motivational speaker Kelsey Tanish talking about embracing our differences and taking care of those in our community.

"WE ALL HAVE A LITTLE CRINKLE IN OUR LIFE."

Kelsey Tainsh has been through more in her 27 years than most will endure in a lifetime. Successfully overcoming a brain tumor at only 5 years of age, Kelsey went on to be a happy, healthy kid and a champion athlete. 10 years later, at 15, it all came crashing down when the tumor returned followed by a crippling stroke. Her friends had disappeared, her right side didn't function and she became paralyzed with fear and self-doubt. Despite her significant physical challenges, she worked hard to pull herself up and charged back into life graduating magna cum laude from the University of Florida.

"LIFE IS ABOUT BEING HAPPY AND HELPING OTHERS."

The presentation took students through Kelsey's extraordinary experiences, using them as examples of how to overcome what they may see as negative differences and turn them into something positive. Through music and dance, humor and stories, students connected with Kelsey and were prompted to think about how they can change their attitude and then change their outcomes in life.



Her message to the students was clear. No matter what life throws at you, there is always a way to be happy and kind.

Main Line near Philadelphia. At Holy Child, Emily can leverage her financial and relationship management background to continue the school's successful fundraising program. Durst Brenheiser has been participating in triathalons all around the country. Durst is pictured at right in Ironman Maryland.



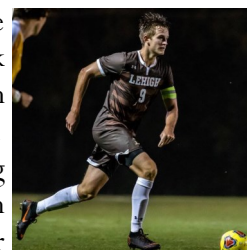
CLASS OF 2010

IN MEMORIAM

Jennifer Sweeney LeVan '72 (1958 – 2015)

We only recently learned of Jennifer's passing when we received a gift of \$71,000 from an anonymous donor to establish the LeVan-Skinner Memorial Fund in memory of Jennifer and her mother Helen Sweeney Skinner. This fund will be held in perpetuity to support scholarships at Wyndcroft. Others are welcome to make additional gifts to this fund.

Glowing tributes in the *Gettysburg Times* and the *Adams*

County Evening Sun highlight Jennifer's drive, originality and remarkable life of service to others in the best tradition of *Non Sibi*. Her life and career path were anything but conventional. "I haven't done anything the right way," she would later say, with her characteristic modesty. She skipped college, but in 1976 she and her best friend, Laura Feldman, created a senior project at Owen J. Roberts High School to study the urban revival just getting underway in Philadelphia, including the city's famed restaurant renaissance. These interests led Jennifer into the restaurant and hospitality business, along with a venture into modeling. Early in her career she worked at a Sheraton near the Philadelphia Airport with Emeril Lagasse, then an unknown young chef. She went on to renown as one of the city's leading catering managers, handling events for celebrities like rock legend David Bowie, jazz singer Phyllis Heyman, actress Audrey Hepburn, '90's rock stars Guns N Roses, and Philadelphia Mayor Frank Rizzo.

In 1981 quite by accident she met her future husband, David LeVan, a young railroad executive, who would rise to become the CEO of Conrail. Jennifer eventually left the catering business, and, in her thirties, trained extensively and became a well-regarded ski instructor. Jennifer came to share David's love for Harley-Davidson motorcycles after the couple took a biking tour of Europe following David's retirement, and they later founded and ran Battlefield Harley-Davidson in David's home town of Gettysburg.

The LeVans provided generous leadership and support for the renewal of Gettysburg, for historic preservation and the arts, and Jennifer devoted her remarkable talent to the Adams County Arts Council. She never stopped working to help others, even personally knitting countless lap blankets for wounded servicemen. She drew on her urban renaissance experience to help the Gettysburg Retail Merchants Association begin "First Fridays," modeled after a program in Philadelphia designed to bring more shoppers downtown.

In 2004, the LeVans served as co-chairs of a \$12.6 million campaign to restore Gettysburg's Majestic Theatre, which re-opened for its 80th anniversary in 2005, and made a \$1 million leadership gift to the project. They also devoted considerable time and resources to the restoration of the historic Lincoln Train Station, where President Abraham Lincoln arrived to deliver the Gettysburg Address.

Lisa Dunn - 15 years. "Time does fly when you are having fun! I am so fortunate that I work in this great community of learners. I have worn many hats at Wyndcroft as a parent, teacher, and now as Assistant Head of School and could not love this school more. The hallways are filled with engaged and curious students that learn from an incredibly talented and passionate faculty. There is not a day that goes by that I don't think how lucky I am to be part of The Wyndcroft School."

Melissa Griffaton - 10 years. "First, I can't believe it has been ten years since I officially began my tenure at Wyndcroft. While curriculum, teaching techniques, technology, and resources have all changed in the last ten years, one thing has always been constant. The idea of community at Wyndcroft has not changed.
